Informal workers, who form the majority of the workforce in most cities of the Global South, contribute to **urban economies** and in multiple other ways. Waste pickers, for example, provide vital **environmental services** to cities. Others, like artisans, performers, or food vendors, foster rich urban **cultural life**. Despite these contributions, informal workers are most often not recognized or included in urban planning processes. Sometimes, their work is stigmatized and penalized through evictions, restrictions and fines.

In WIEGO's five Focal Cities - Accra, Ghana; Dakar, Senegal; Delhi, India; Lima, Peru and Mexico City, Mexico - informal workers are mobilizing against negative stereotypes and unjust practices and policies, and approaching governments with **solutions that have the potential to benefit all who live in the city.**

The work in each Focal City is determined by the local context and worker priorities. These strategies cut across all five cities:

Strengthen **CAPACITY AND SKILLS** in priority areas, identified together with worker organizations based on their needs. Common areas across cities include:

- Collective bargaining
- Administrative law and legal empowerment
- Strengthening leadership and democratic organizational capacity
- Context-specific trainings on policies/regulations affecting informal workers

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 Coalitions between worker and civil society organizations around shared priorities

Expand LOCAL NETWORKS AND SOLIDARITY within

and across different sectors of workers (including

street/market vendors, waste pickers and home-based

workers, as well as other groups that vary by city) and

with allied groups to build supportive local networks. This

Increase **PUBLIC AWARENESS** of informal workers' contributions and struggles, as a way to challenge negative stereotypes and build support for informal workers among city residents and government officials. This work varies by city, including:

- Image campaigns on workers' positive contributions to cities
- Issue-based campaigns
- Public projects such as photo exhibitions
- Communicating to broad audiences through television, radio, online and print publications



Facilitate **DIALOGUE BETWEEN GOVERNMENTS AND WORKERS** through support to workers' organizations during every phase of the process, including:

- **Preparation:** Supporting workers' organizations in building advocacy capacity and confidence, outlining and framing arguments, obtaining evidence and cultivating key allies.
- **Dialogue:** Facilitating engagement between workers and government officials in a range of productive formats ranging from information sharing to negotiation.
- Accountability: Coordinating efforts with workers' organizations to ensure commitments made are kept, or to advocate for continued dialogue.
